

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS OF TOWN MEETING.

At the Annual Town Meeting held in the Town of Collegerville
in the County of Searns and State of Minnesota, at
S. John's College Mill on the fourteenth day of March, 1882,
the Meeting was called to order by Peter Eich
Peter Eich
was then chosen to preside as Moderator of the meeting.

The Moderator at the opening of the meeting, stated the business to be transacted and the order of the same as follows: That the business to be transacted would be to elect three Supervisors---one of whom should be designated on the ballots as chairman---one Town Clerk, one Treasurer, one Assessor, two Justice's of the Peace, one Constable and one Overseer of Highways for each road district in said Town;

also, to determine by ballot the time and manner of running at large of cattle, horses, mules, asses and sheep within said Town; also, to determine by ballot whether license to sell spirituous, vinous, or fermented and malt liquors shall be granted to any person or persons in said Town; and to do any other business proper to be done at said meeting.

That said business would be entertained in the following order: 1st---The election by ballot of town officers, and the voting by ballot whether cattle, horses, mules, asses and sheep should run at large within said Town, and the voting by ballot whether license to sell liquors in said Town would be granted, the polls for such purpose to be kept open throughout the day. 2nd---At one o'clock p. m., election of Overseer of Highways for each road district in the Town. 3rd---That immediately following the election of Overseers of Highways, the general business of the Town would be taken up and proceeded with until disposed of.

The Moderator then stated that the following resolution had been proposed to be voted on by ballot: "Resolved, that it shall be lawful for horses, mules, asses and sheep to run at large in the Town of in the daytime, from the first day of April to the 15th day of October in each year until further ordered." That the ballots for such purpose must be in these words, viz: "In Favor of Restraining Cattle" or "Against Restraining Cattle," and must be placed in the same ballot-box with the votes cast for town officers, and to be canvassed in the same manner as the ballots for town officers. Proclamation of opening the polls was then made by the Moderator and the polls opened and the election of town officers proceeded.

The hour of one o'clock p. m., having arrived and the general business of the Town being now in order, the following named persons were elected by ayes and noes, Overseers of Highways for the ensuing year in the following road districts: viz:

..... was elected Poundmaster of said Town.

On motion, ordered that a Pound for impounding animals be established at within days from this date, not to exceed in cost the sum of dollars, to be under the care and direction of the Poundmaster.

The following three places were determined and designated by the voters present as the most public places in said Town for the posting up of legal notices, and suitable posts for such purpose were ordered to be erected or maintained by the Supervisors at each of such places, viz:

John's Mill

George's Mill

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The supervisors submitted to the electors a report of all the places at which guide posts are erected and maintained within the Town, and of all places at which, in their opinion, they ought to be erected and maintained. Thereupon, it was ordered that guide posts be erected and maintained at the following places, viz:

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The Town Clerk read publicly the Report of the Board of Auditors, including a statement of the fiscal concerns of the Town, and an estimate of the sums necessary for the current and incidental expenses of the Town for the ensuing year.

The Supervisors rendered an account in writing, stating the labor assessed and performed in the Town; the sums received by them for fines and commutations, &c.; a statement of the improvements

The following is a statement of the result of the canvass of votes by ballot for the election of officers at the Annual Town Meeting in the Town of Colfax County of Stearns and State of Minnesota, March fourteenth 1887, as publicly canvassed by the judges at said meeting;

On motion, Resolved, Bridge Fund Fifty Dollars.

On motion Resolved, that Wencislav Proen will take care of Koronkolaki, at \$15.00 per month, in health or during sickness, if the said Koronkolaki does not come to him to board \$5 some amount to be refunded to the town. Medicine & funeral expenses etc.

The next Annual Town Meeting was ordered to be held at St. John's College

At five o'clock the polls were closed, proclamation thereof being made by the Moderator. The judges then proceeded to publicly canvass the votes, and the persons having the greatest number of votes for the respective offices voted for, were declared elected.
